

Dear Friends:

From the Pastor's Desk

Even as the pandemic continues to affect the lives of us all, we can say that, as of this writing, we in Connecticut have done quite well in our efforts to contain the spread of the COVID -19 virus. The hospitalization rate has fallen dramatically from its height in late March to mid-April even if it has fluctuated slightly from day to day, something which, I suppose, is to be

expected. The rate of positivity remains under 1% and that in itself speaks to the good things that can happen if we all work together. The wearing of a mask or face covering can, at times, seem to be a nuisance especially in these summer months, but we can all put up with the nuisance and the inconvenience for the common good, as well as for our own good. Of course, proper social distancing and good hand hygiene remain essential.

I write these words as a means of positive encouragement, primarily because we all need some encouragement and hope. If we fixate ourselves on the news of late, not only that pertaining to the pandemic but also that concerning the lawlessness and rioting occurring in so many cities in our nation, we can find ourselves overwhelmed even to the point of despair. The mayhem and lawlessness that we see in news reports can be unnerving to watch and fill us with worry about the future. While we cannot ignore these realities, it is important for us to situate them in a wider context, knowing that we still live in a nation, a society grounded in law and order. For one thing, we must support our police and resist the unwise calls for defunding police forces and crippling their ability to do their work safely and effectively. What is needed now for most of us is a solid dose of reason and common sense. We can and should contact our elected representatives, be they here in Milford, in Hartford or in Washington, and urge them to do what is right, what makes sense, and what will promote the common good and security of all of us. We can urge them to avoid pandering and to do what is necessary to restore and maintain good order in society, which is absolutely essential if society is to survive.

Here at Precious Blood Parish, as Deacon John noted in his message in last week's bulletin, we are returning to normalcy in a gradual way. Plans are well along regarding the reopening of school at the end of August. We have scheduled Masses for First Communion during the month of October. I will ask for (and should receive) from Archbishop Blair, the faculty (or authorization) to confirm the young people in our parish. While Confirmation is normally conferred by a bishop, any priest may confer the sacrament in certain circumstances when delegated by the bishop. With all the concern about social distancing and the difficulty of having large Confirmation ceremonies, given the fact that we have over one hundred candidates, we will have to hold five ceremonies, with twenty candidates at each. Along with the candidates and their sponsors, and allowing for no more than two or three family members to attend, we will be able to adhere to the limit of no more than one hundred people in attendance at any ceremony, which is the limit as of this writing as established by Governor Lamont.

That being said, we are still planning to offer classes for adults who would like to be confirmed. They are scheduled for four Mondays: September 14, 21, 28 and October 5 beginning at 7:00 PM. Please let any adult you may know who would like to be confirmed know about this and have them contact Deacon John at (203) 878-3571 to indicate their interest and have any questions they may have answered.

A FAMILY PERSPECTIVE

The National Ministry to the Bereaved, Inc. has recommended several approaches when reaching out to the bereaved. It is sometimes hard to know what to say. Over the next few weeks we will offer some of their suggestions.

Please do not say: I know just how you feel. Time heals. Think about how happy he is in heaven.

Say instead: This has to be a hard time for you; does it help to talk about him. We cared about him too, can we talk about him. Grieving people have told me it helps to talk about the person who died.

Please do not say: Be thankful he was not aware at the end. He had a good life.

Say instead: It must have been difficult to watch her pain all those months. When I came to visit it always hurt to see her in pain, but I still miss her. I am wondering if you are feeling empty; is it difficult to fill the time? (to be continued)
