#### SPIRITUAL COMMUNION

"My Jesus, I believe that Thou art present in the most Holy Sacrament. I love thee about all things, and I desire to receive Thee into my soul. Since I can not now receive thee sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace thee, as if thou wert already there, and unite myself wholly to Thee; never permit me to be separated from Thee."

In 1941, at the Auschwitz prison camp, as select prisoners were being marched to starvation bunkers, Fr. Kolbe (#16670) requested he take one man's place. Before he and the others were tortured and eventually burned, he remarked: "Courage my sons. Don't you see that we are



leaving on a mission? They pay our fare in the bargain. What a piece of good luck! The thing to do now is to pray well in order to win as many souls as possible. Let us, then, tell the Blessed Virgin that we are content, and that she can do with us anything she wishes."

#### NINETEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First, I would like to share a report from the Haiti Mission Board:

We now have a member of our board who is Haitian and speaks both French and Creole. She has been able to get in touch with Father Chery, the pastor of Saint Therese parish, by phone. There has been a terrible drought in Haiti and the people of Marbial have lost most of their crops. Many families are going hungry.

Through the Parish Twinning Committee of the Americas we were able to get in touch with a charity that has an excellent record in Haiti: Food For The Poor. They deliver packages of food to various parishes in Haiti. One package of food will feed a family of five for one month. The package includes: 55 pounds of rice, 27.5 pounds of cornmeal, 20 pounds of beans, 122 cans of sardines and one gallon of vegetable oil. We sent \$1240.00 (which will be doubled) to Food For The Poor so they can deliver 40 food packages to Marbial.

Food For The Poor will have to drop their packages off in Jacmel, (the nearest "city" to Marbial) as it is very difficult to get into Marbial itself because of the lack of decent roads. Father Chery said he would pick up the food but the church van is broken. He sent us an invoice for the repair of the van (which he badly needs). We sent \$900.00 so Father can have the van fixed. We are also sending \$500.00 per month to Father so he can buy food locally for his people.

We have this money because of the great generosity of our parishioners. It doesn't look as if we will be able to get a medical mission down there anytime in the near future, so we are spending the money on food. We are also investigating how we can help Father with his school.

The addition of a native speaker to our board has been a huge help. It now looks as if we will be able to help the poor suffering people of Marbial in several ways. THANK YOU EVERYONE who has contributed to our Mission to Haiti fundraisers! We may investigate helping Father Chery with funding some of the costs of teachers for his school, the only school available in the area.

#### A FAMILY PERSPECTIVE

The demands of family can be so overwhelming we feel walking on water would be easier. When Jesus was pressured, He dismissed everyone, so he could be "by himself and pray." When overwhelmed and stressed, go to a quiet place and surrender your pressured feelings to the Lord using Peter's prayer in today's gospel: "Lord, save me."

"Although we may feel unsure how best to comfort those who mourn, we must stand with them in their time of suffering. Miscarriage touches the lives of many people, yet all too often this tragedy remains unaddressed. This lack of response not only often leads to unresolved grief, but also fails to clearly manifest our belief that each person, from conception onward, is precious and unique."

National Catholic Ministry to the Bereaved, Inc. other suggestions when reaching out: (con't.) Please do not say: It will take 2 or 3 months to get over your grief. Your grief will lessen in time. Or

You need to get on with your life.

**Instead say**: I hope others are not trying to hurry you through your grief. This must be a very hard time for you. **Or** I have heard that each person grieves in their own way and in their own time.

**Please do not say**: I know someone who had 2 family members die at the same time. At least you have others in your family. **Or** There are other people worse off than you.

**Instead say**: I wonder if you feel like you will never get better. Expressing your tears and your pain will help you feel better eventually. **Or** Talking to the person who has died can help you sort out your feelings.

#### True effective support is not dependent upon how much we say but rather on our presence and how effectively we listen.
