
We continue to appreciate those who join us for Mass, funerals, baptisms, and weddings. We thank you for helping us to do all these safely, and your cooperation by wearing masks, sitting socially distant, and not congregating inside make this possible. We will keep you informed concerning when other activities may be returning.

Groups that wish to meet should contact Deacon John at the rectory to discuss how this can be done. In a nutshell, indoor meetings are limited to 25 persons, all must be masked and socially distant. No food and drink are allowed at meetings, which we know is disappointing to some, but necessary to maintain the safety of all. School cleaning protocols do not allow for any outside group to use the school or pre-school buildings currently.

A reminder about Anointing of the Sick: we can arrange for a family member to be anointed at the hospital or nursing home, but the request must come from the family to the hospital or nursing home, then the hospital or nursing home contact us to arrange for a visit by a priest. The priest cannot call the hospital or just "show up" to anoint someone. Do not hesitate to advocate for a family member to be anointed, knowing that your request will be honored if timely and possible.

We again thank those who have contributed to the Archbishop's Annual Appeal, and those who may choose to support the mission appeal this weekend at Saint Mary Church, and September 19 and 20 at Saint Agnes Church. Our mission appeal homilist is Father Sam, and the proceeds of the appeal will benefit his diocese in Kerala. In 1610 Peter Claver left Spain to be a Jesuit missionary in Caragena (now Colombia), a chief center for the slave trade coming from Africa to the Americas. As the ships moved into port he was there to minister to the slaves with food and medicine. During the 40 years of his ministry Peter Claver instructed and baptized



an estimate 300,000 slaves. Beyond his care for slaves, he preached in the public square and gave missions to sailors and traders. He understood that concrete service (food, etc.) was as effective a communication as verbal preaching. "We must speak to them with our hands before we try to speak to them with our lips," he said.

He was canonized in 1888, and Pope Leo XIII declared him the worldwide patron of missionary work among black slaves.

But when politics ceases to be politics and begins to be a religion, ...when it denies both the freedom of conscience and freedom of religion, when it competes with religion on its own ground, the immortal soul that is destined for God, then religion protests. And when it does, its protest is not against politics but against a counterreligion that is antireligious.



FAITHFUL CITIZENSHIP

Faithful Citizenship is a quadrennial document published by the United States bishops that provides guidance to voters during

a presidential election year.

In 2016 we printed a summary of that document that outlines the core principles that underlie Catholic engagement in the political realm. Part II is a consideration of the process by which these principles are applied to the act of voting and taking positions on policy issues. The documents states: *"We bishops do not intend to tell Catholics for whom or against whom to vote. Our purpose is to help Catholics form their consciences in accordance with God's truth"* (No. 7).
