

The Sanctuary Lamp Week of January 3, 2021 Is in Memory of Susan and Michael



Sometimes called Twelfth Night (12 days after Christmas), Epiphany is derived from the Greek word meaning "manifestation." We commemorate the occasion on which God, through Christ, was made manifest to the whole world, represented by the Magi. Epiphany was first used in the Christian sense by St. Paul referring to both the first and final coming of Christ in his letter to Timothy "He saved us...now made manifest through the appearance of our savior Christ Jesus, who brought life and immortality to light through the gospel...." and in his letter to Titus "For the grace of God has appeared saving us all...as we await the blessed hope, the appearance of the great God and our savior Jesus Christ."

EPIPHANY OF THE LORD

Dear Friends:

This Sunday marks a new beginning of sorts. This is the first Sunday of a new year, and a year that we all hope after the trying year through which we have been, will see a return to some semblance of normalcy of life. In spite of all the challenges we have had to face, both individually and as a nation and a world community, we have much for which to be thankful as we launch into 2021. For the near future at least, we will have to continue to be vigilant and careful regarding COVID-19, wearing our masks, keeping social distance, and washing our hands properly. Doing such can seem to be a nuisance at times, but it really is an act of Christian love. In following the protocols, we not only do what we can to care for our own health, we also do what we can to help others around us, whether they be loved ones or people we may pass in the store or elsewhere, stay healthy and safe. There is an important maxim that is taught in Catholic theology, namely "that grace builds on nature." This teaching holds that we are obligated to do all we can in a given situation, and then God, according to his goodness and holy will, takes it from there. It is never proper just to sit idly by and expect God to do everything for us. God does love us and wants the best for us, but he also asks that we work with him and do what we can in living out our lives.

The Annual Collection for 2020 was a resounding success. We surpassed our goal of \$60,000. The total received as of the writing of these words, just a few days before Christmas, is \$62,269. I thank everyone who made a gift to the collection, and again, even at the risk of sounding repetitive, I do want to thank you, the people, for your outstanding and ongoing generosity to the parish. We could not do what we do without your support.

By way of reminder, our twinning ministry with Ste. Therese Parish in Marbial, Haiti, is still in place. The committee meets regularly to discuss ways that we can do something to help the people there who are in such need. A recent vote of the committee, which I endorse, is that we send a contribution of \$500 monthly to help to feed the children of Marbial, many of whom, if they are fortunate, might get just one meal a day. Happily, we have funds on hand to support that additional outreach, again thanks to your generosity over the years. Due to the pandemic and the ongoing political situation in Haiti, we will not be sponsoring a medical mission for the foreseeable future, but we are setting aside some of the funds in reserve in the hope that a medical mission to Marbial can take place when possible. In the meantime, should anyone feel so inclined, we will continue to welcome contributions to the Haiti ministry. As always, make checks payable to Precious Blood Parish and note on the memo line "Haiti" and your gift will be properly credited. With Lent approaching in just over a month or so, we will once again have the Healing Tree available in both churches with proceeds going to the Haiti ministry. Making donations to that effort is an excellent way to practice almsgiving, one of the pillar spiritual practices of our faith, especially in Lent.

In conclusion, let me, on behalf of the clergy and staff, wish all of you a wonderful, happy and healthy New Year!

WHO WERE THE MAGI?

We sing songs, give gifts, and move three mysterious men into our manger scenes. There's a rich heritage in the Catholic Church of celebrating the magi, but their origins are steeped in mystery. The original Greek calls these men *magoi*. The word is translated elsewhere in Scripture to mean "magician," but a similar word was used in ancient history to describe an entirely different set of people altogether. In what is now modern-day Iran, the ruling empire had a wealthy priestly caste known as the Magi. At the time of Christ, the Magi formed one of the ruling councils of the Parthian Empire. These priests

interpreted dreams and read the stars to anticipate major events that could affect the fortunes of the empire.

We're not exactly sure where the magi of the Gospels traveled from. Matthew simply says "the east." History tells us that the ancient regions of Persia, Assyria, and Babylon all had a magi priesthood at the time of Christ. Whichever region they hailed from they traveled hundreds of miles and represent the manifestation of Christ to the entire known world. The identification of the Magi as kings is linked to Old Testament prophecies that describe the Messiah's being worshipped by kings in Isaiah and the Psalms, "Yea, all kings shall fall down before him: all nations serve him." Early readers reinterpreted Matthew in light of these prophecies and elevated the Magi to kings.

A FAMILY PERSPECTIVE

The Magi in today's gospel were led to Jesus by a star. Who are the stars your children follow? Don't let it be the tabloid stars. Resolve in this New Year to be the guiding star in the life of your children.

Why have modern presidents relied on 'faith advisers'?

Politicians love to use religion and faith to legitimize their policies in order to make themselves and those policies appear "righteous." How can Trump's faith advisers and Biden's incoming ones both be right when their views on faith and policies mostly contradict each other, and in some cases are contrary to a high view of Scripture?

Abraham Lincoln raised the same question in his second inaugural address when he said of the conflicting advice he was receiving from unsolicited faith advisers of his day: "Both read the same Bible, and pray to the same God; and each invokes His aid against the other....The prayers of both could not be answered; that of neither has been answered fully. The Almighty has His own purposes."

In his "Prescription Against Heresies," Tertullian viewed faith "as the submission of our will to the Divine Authority."

Nathan's direct confrontation of David led to David's writing one of the great Psalms of genuine repentance and acknowledgement to God that "Against you, you only, have I sinned and done what is evil in your sight; so you are right in your verdict and justified when you judge." (Psalm 51:4)

That's the kind of faith adviser who should matter to any leader.

"Two considerations are helpful in developing a good deposition. The first is to be mindful that a happy conscience makes a happy outlook on life, and an unhappy conscience makes us miserable on the inside and everyone else

The readiness to believe evil about others is in a large part ammunition for a thousand scandals in our own hearts. 
