

#### Frequently Asked Questions #2

FORWARD

How will my parish benefit from the campaign? Each parish receives 50% of the funds raised from its parishioners for its own needs. Once a parish reaches its target, 80% of funds over the target will be retained by the parish. *The remainder of ampaign funds may return either directly or indirectly via HBF grantmaking activities within its funding priorities.* 

#### Will the Archbishop's Annual Appeal continue?

Yes. The Archbishop's Annual Appeal (approximately \$10 million per year) provides the day-to-day support to ministries and charitable works of the Archdiocese. Donors will therefore be asked to maintain current annual gift levels in addition to campaign gifts.

Will the campaign affect parish offertory?

Parishes rely on their offertory collection. Parishioners are asked not to diminish giving to the offertory or the Archbishop's Annual Appeal collection but rather to consider an increased commitment to their parish and to the Archdiocese.

When will funds be distributed by The Harford Bishops' Foundation?

The Hartford Bishops' Foundation has distributed more than \$7 million in grants *to* support Catholic initiatives. The parish share of the funds collected are disbursed two times a year.

With so much uncertainty, is this the best time for a campaign?

The events of 2020 are unprecedented and have resulted in extraordinary needs in our parishes, schools, and Catholic organizations. As parish life returns to the "new normal," we set our sites on resuming the good work of the Church, including through important initiatives, including FWF.

Can donors make gifts of stock or other non-cash gifts?

Yes. The campaign accepts gifts of stock, those from Donor Advised Funds, IRA distributions, and other means. Donors wishing to make non-cash gifts should speak with their pastor/pastoral administrator or contact The Hartford Bishops' Foundation at\_(860) 761-7455. If considering an estate gift, donors should contact The Hartford Bishops' Foundation for assistance.

Are gifts to the campaign tax deductible?

Yes. Gifts to the campaign are tax deductible as allowed by law. The Foundation will acknowledge all gifts and pledges including substantiation of each gift for donor tax purposes.

#### How are campaign expenses being paid?

The Foundation is meeting campaign expenses, which will be paid from the HBF portion of funds collected.

#### Dear Friends:

This Third Sunday of Advent is traditionally referred to as "Gaudete Sunday." The word *gaudete* is a Latin word which means "rejoice" and it comes from the entrance antiphon for the Third Sunday of Advent, taken from St. Paul's Letter to the Philippians, which reads, "*Rejoice in the Lord always; again, I say, rejoice. Indeed, the Lord is near.*" We are fortunate this year that the second reading for this Sunday's Mass consists of a fuller quotation from the Letter of the Philippians containing this line.

What does it mean to rejoice? To rejoice means to find joy in life. But what is joy and how are we to understand it in terms of our faith in Christ? The Greek word for "joy" is chara, and it is used to describe a feeling of inner gladness, delight or rejoicing. In the New Testament, real joy is not to be found in "things" but in spiritual realities. We find joy in God, God's closeness to us, and our closeness to God. The circumstances of life are not necessarily or even primarily our source of joy. When things are going well, and all seems harmonious and in order in our lives, we can be joyful, *feel* joyful. But when the circumstances of life become challenging, difficult, or out of sorts, we can still be joyful even in the midst of it all, even if we do not *feel* it. Why is that? It is because of our faith in God, our absolute trust in God's goodness and love, and our willingness to accept whatever God wills for us, knowing in the depths of our being that all will, as St. Paul says in his Letter to the Romans, "work out for good."

If we confine ourselves to looking around at the world of today with its multiple challenges, there is much reason for not being joyful, much reason for allowing ourselves to become consumed by fear, bitterness, and lethargy. The increasing tensions with China and Russia. The economic problems at home with rising inflation, concerns about supply lines. The ongoing concerns about COVID-19 and its ever-evolving variants. These are just to name a few and do not even begin to touch on the uniquely stressful circumstances of each of our own lives. The words of St. Paul today are needed more than ever. We are to rejoice in the Lord in spite of it all. We do our best as we can, given the circumstances of our lives, but we leave the rest to God, and God will not fail us. In due time and in ways perhaps that may be very surprising to us, God's plan is being worked out. We ask God to grant us the patience to persevere, the strength to go on living our lives each day, fully, well, and prudently. We ask God to deepen our faith and trust in him and to renew and strengthen our hope so that we may truly be able to rejoice in the Lord, no matter what may come.
